Pastor's Desk

A famous preacher received a letter from a church member, which began as follows: "I listened to your sermon on suffering last Sunday. I just wanted you to know that I didn't know what suffering was until I heard you preach." On a more serious note, he received a letter from another member -- a mother -- who wrote that she didn't know what love was until she really heard the Gospel preached.

The preacher explained that this mother was always very active in the Church, always ready to help. And she believed she was a Christian. But there was one big problem. One of her children, it seems, had given her a lot of trouble. The mother complained that her child learned how to say 'No' at an early age -- and then just kept saying it. This disrupted the mother's comfortable life, and she began to resent her daughter for it. And her resentment became more and more evident to the daughter until, finally, the thirteen-year-old girl ran away from home. The note she left read, "It's obvious, mother, that you don't love me, and it would be better for both of us if I go

The mother's world collapsed, and a deep sense of hopelessness and despair set in until she finally became honest enough to say, 'I don't love my daughter. I don't even love myself.' At that moment, she went down on her knees to begin the whole business of being a Christian all over again -- from scratch. And the words she'd been hearing all her life about God's love and forgiveness and reconciliation suddenly grasped her as they never had before. The Grace of God she had heard about and talked about became real to her for the first time -- and her whole life changed from the inside out. And when she found her daughter, a miraculous reconciliation began.

This is what Paul was so concerned about when he wrote his letter to the Galatians. They had heard the Gospel preached, but it was apparent that it was not making a real difference in their lives. They were "keeping the faith" on a very superficial level in their Church-going and show of allegiance to the Law. But they had not been grasped by the Grace of God's love at a level deep enough to make a real difference in their lives and

relationships. Paul, therefore, says to them: "Out of love, place yourselves at one another's service. The whole law has found its fulfillment in this one saying: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' If you bite and tear one another to pieces, take care! You will end up in mutual destruction!" (Gal.5:13-15).

Immerse yourself in this love of God. Know that it is in your being, and at this very moment, a miracle can occur. Those who have been hearing this all your lives at one level will hear it now at a deep level and new level. Because God is present, God's Grace is in you.

Discussion Questions

First Reading: 1 Kings 19:16b, 19-21

- 1. What was Elisha doing when he was called? Does God call other people in the bible in the same way? Does God call you to make changes in your everyday life?
- 2. Were the people whom God called to be prophets highly educated or socially elite? Does God have prerequisites for

prophets? What would your issues be if you were called as a prophet today?

Second Reading: Galatians 5:1, 13-18

- 1. "For you were called for freedom." What is the source of such freedom? Is "going out of yourself" a freeing experience? What about the act of loving your neighbor?
- 2. St Paul says "if you are guided by the Spirit, you are not under the law." Under the direction and guidance of the Spirit, could some Church laws change?

Gospel: Luke 9:51-62

- 1. The man said, "Lord, let me first go bury my father." This would be a good thing, but is there reason for urgency in proclaiming the kingdom? Where do you see such a need today? Ecojustice? Immigration? Incarceration? Changing the gun laws?
- 2. Why does Pope Francis say that Jesus was homeless or itinerant? Why does the Church need to be itinerant or in motion and "not sedentary within her enclosure"?

The first character promises him: "I will follow you wherever you go" (Lk 9:57). Generous! But Jesus replies that the Son of man, unlike foxes that have holes, and birds that have nests, "has nowhere to lay his head" (Lk 9:58). The absolute poverty of Jesus. Indeed, Jesus left his paternal home and gave up all security in order to proclaim the Kingdom of God to the lost sheep of his people. In this way Jesus pointed out to us, his disciples, that our mission in the world cannot be static, but is itinerant. The Christian is itinerant.

The Church by her very nature is in motion; she does not stay sedentary and calm within her enclosure. She is open to the broadest horizons, sent forth—the Church is sent forth—to bring the Gospel through the streets and to reach the human and existential peripheries.
