

Pastor's Desk

The Gospel this week is a familiar story of relationship. At the beginning of the story, Jesus and Bartimaeus are strangers; by the end, Bartimaeus becomes a follower of Jesus.

This single encounter transforms into a relationship through a series of invitations. Jesus invites Bartimaeus into relationship when he calls him forth and asks him what he wants Jesus to do for him.

Jesus does the same for us. He invites us to bring our needs before him and to ask for important things. Our prayers are not always answered in the immediate and obvious way that Jesus heals this blind man but bringing them forth builds our relationship with Christ and reminds us of our reliance on him.

Jesus does not have to wait for Bartimaeus to call him, but this is very often the way Jesus works. He does not force himself into our lives but waits patiently, letting us call upon him when we are ready. It is true that Jesus is always more powerful than we are and there we are always in a state of need before him. But Jesus wants to enter loving relationship with us, not just to demonstrate a one-sided exercise of his power.

Then there is Jesus' invitation to come forward, which is echoed by the crowd that tells Bartimaeus to "Take courage." We see here the importance of community; we are not meant to be in relationship with in a strictly one-on-one way. Rather, Jesus places us in community and uses that community to draw us closer to him. We are meant to go together to God. We see this in the first reading, when God calls back the remnant of Israel and delivers them from exile. Pat of their healing is being gathered back together after being scattered across the earth. Their number includes the vulnerable; mothers of small children, pregnant women, and even those who are blind and lame. They are not all healed, but they are given each other. In the midst of a community, they find support. They all go together to the joy that God has promised them.

How do we invite a deeper and more trusting community? Whom do we exclude, whether purposefully or by benign neglect? How do we invite Christ into our relationships? Do we see him present in those we encounter? How is Jesus inviting us to extend his healing presence in the world?

The final invitation from our story of the Gospel. Jesus tells Bartimaeus to go his way, and rather than departing, Bartimaeus follows him. In curing his blindness, Jesus enables Bartimaeus to make this choice in freedom. A new world is available to him, and he chooses to follow Christ.

Keep on Asking

Near the screened-in porch where I sat making my yearly retreat one summer night, a thicket of ducks quacked its way across the lake and into a tree or two.

Their loud, non-stop, ever-increasing racket was a shock. Each and every duck citizen, it seemed, felt a duty to yell in full voice and all at once! I supposed they were having a rollicking good time, but what did they achieve with their babble?

Had they come for an evening's rest? But how could anyone rest with this earsplitting quack-talk?

When they were safely ensconced there began a subtle change in the clatter, very gradual, as when applause reaches a peak at a concert and then, almost unnoticeably, crests and trails off. Each bird gave a bit of quiet to the next until everyone was comfortable and calm.

Except one.

This individual went on and on cawing, absurdly, all by itself.

Then at last a duck-mate nudged it and said, "Hey, buddy we're all surrounding you and we're all safe. Zip up your beak." And it did. There ensued the sleepy silence that I had thought they wanted all along.

And I understood this as teamwork.

I have always loved to be included in a team. Nobody perfect, yet everyone having a special place, keeping the rules, moving along together, and someone comforting the one who can't take a hint. Today I suppose we would call it community. Or family.

God confirms this in the First Reading.

I will gather the blind and the lame, ... the mothers and those with child; they shall return as an immense throng. They departed in tears, but I will console them and guide them; I will lead them to brooks of water, on a level road, so that none shall stumble.

My duck friends might seem to be symbols for this reading. Their alarums—and finally their trusting slumber—maybe weren't so different from what we ourselves do. Our loudlonging is heard by God, who is saying, "hush, child, the whole flock is here. Settle down."

In Sunday's Gospel Blind Bartimaeus, like the last duck, couldn't stop calling out to Jesus. "Son of David have pity on me!" The rest of the flock tried to shush him, but he kept right on. Over and over, "Son of David have pity on me!"

Jesus stopped walking and said, "call him." The man waded through the crowd to Jesus, who asked him the same question the squawking ducks had heard: "What do you want?" In this case it was obvious. A blind man would want his sight back. Surely Jesus would not have missed this.

"Master, I want to see."

But just getting his sight back would not have done it, any more than just landing in the trees did the ducks. Bartimaeus already had the incarnate God standing before him, and maybe this was the fullness of what he "wanted to see."

"Your faith has saved you," Jesus said. And the man saw. And followed.

If Jesus asks you or me, "what do you want," how will we answer? Is the faith that saves us hiding deep within us? Are we able to call for help? Such a call can be fulfilled this very day, you know, if you let it.

Try listening.

"What do you want?"
