

We have wonderful readings this Sunday. The first reading from the book of Numbers, one of the five books that is considered by the Israel people as the five books of the law. The story of Moses was ask by God to choose seventy elders to assist him in his ministry with the Israel people, two of the Elders, Eldad and Medad missed the gathering of Elders however, they end up able to prophesy, Joshua the son of Moses complained about the two renegades, but Moses reminded Joshua that the spirit chooses freely. disciples complained to Jesus that they found preachers healing, at that time there were able to pray and ask for healing it is a common thing. Jesus' words that we often hear is "For whoever is not against us is for us."

The second readings are from the letters of James and He is warning the rich not to withhold wages with their employee, which was a common thing to do to exploit poor people which causes poverty in the community.

What is the lesson we could learn from the scripture so we can grow in knowledge and wisdom.

- 1. Embracing inclusivity in God's work: Both the first reading and the Gospel encourage us to recognize that God's works through many different people, sometimes in ways we don't expect. We are called to rejoice in the good that others do, even though they are not part of our immediate community or group. This required humility and an openness to diverse ways in which God's spirit operates.
- 2. Small acts matter: Even the smallest act of kindness, like giving a cup of water in Christ's name have a significant spiritual value and will be rewarded. Focus on compassion in daily life. Recognize that every action, no matter how small, contributes to a larger purpose. Develop a heart that is ready to serve others, even in small ways.
- 3. Responsibility towards others: We must be careful not to cause others, especially those who are vulnerable [the little ones], to stumble of sin. Leading others astray carries serious consequences.
- 4. Cultivate responsibility: understand the influence we have on others and be mindful of how our words, actions and attitudes can impact them. This lesson encourages us to model integrity and moral responsibility, particularly for those who look up to us.
- 5. Develop discipline and self-awareness: Be willing to make difficult but necessary changes to avoid harmful habits or influences. This may involve removing unhealthy relationships, environments, or behaviors that tempt us into wrongdoing.
- 6. Live with long term, eternal mindset. The decision we make today have a lasting consequence, not just for this life but for the life to come. Fostering a mindset that values spiritual growth and integrity over immediate gratification is essential.

May the lesson we hear from the scripture assist us in growing in faith and in contestant reflection of His love for us.

Spirituality Of The Readings

The Inside Story

You and I, we have an exterior aspect, of course. But we also have an interior one. This seems to be the key to this Sunday's Gospel.

Our exterior is what we often make use of to interact in a daily fashion with everything and everybody, without thinking about it. This is our outside. Acting from it, we may come across to others as, e.g., decisive or fun-loving or threatening or shy or easy to talk to, or who knows what else. It is how we make our way through the day in a busy world, or even in a non-busy time (e.g., reserved for watching TV, drinking beer, staying busy all the time, and so on).

We can find clues to our interior self in a calm time, such as we find at a quiet lake or at the sight of a budding tree or in the company of a much-loved friend. Stillness then emerges, a hushed sense of wellbeing. This deep interior is where feelings and thoughts can be themselves, can be just as happy or as sad as they feel like being

The Spirit of God chooses to dwell in these interior depths. Not because there is something wrong with the outside, but because the deep interior is where we are made in God's image. There we are quietly open, desiring to give real love to other people and to receive it. And, if we knew it, to and from God.

The exterior sometimes dwells its life in storm, sometimes in sunlight. It is able at times to out-shout the inside! I want food. I want revenge. I am grouchy. I got three hours of sleep last night, gimme rest. Gimme pleasure. Gimme triumph. I want everything. Gimme!

Fine, but what if you get all these demands? What if you gain the whole world but in the process lose your very self?

You and I do get caught up in gaining external things. For instance, in Luke 12:15-24 Jesus points out this tendency. He says something like this:

You have built still another barn to hold your riches! But this very night God will ask your actual soul of you, and what will you take with you? Your riches? No. The way you look? No. Your interior self is all that can come with you when you die. God dwells in that inner self, in the quiet recesses of your being.

Today's Gospel. does not receive well those who lead others away from their interior. Jesus says how he might react to anyone who teaches children in such a way.

Whoever causes sin in one of these little ones who believe in me, it would be better if a great millstone were put around his neck and he were thrown into the sea. Gospel

Maybe you were taught in this way. But do you really now want to ignore such a crucial part of yourself, while there is still time to find it? Why not let your inner self have a chance, as Jesus suggests.

How?

Spend some time in quiet each day. Have the heart to give a cup of water to someone thirsty. Be alert for the Spirit within other persons and respect them for it. Even if you do not like them.

You will be following Sunday's Gospel!
