KAZAKHSTAN MISSION

At a small hotel in the city of Almaty, the gospel was preached, and ministers were trained to take the gospel back to their churches. For a week we met in a small conference room with 6 tables set up facing the front of the room. Two students sat at each table. But before we get to the details of my experience teaching these wonderful students, I should tell the whole story of how this trip came to be and the call God put upon me to be a part of this important work.

The story actually began right here at our church in February earlier this year. As you recall, we were hosting Presbytery for the first time since 2017. We hosted elders and pastors from the Presbytery of the Midwest here in Greenville. I happen to be the Church Health Coordinator for the EPC GA office here in this region. My role in this position is to support the churches in our area with resources and training toward developing and maintaining evangelistic culture within their congregations. In my role, I regularly deliver updates to the assembly on the work I am doing with congregations across Indiana, Michigan and Ohio. (Continued on page 6)

KAZAKHSTAN MISSION (CONT.)

While at the meeting, some of my close friends Andrew Morton and Adam Reasoner approached me with an opportunity to go to Kazakhstan to teach students and ministers there for World Outreach. These two friends represent the EPC GA office for World Outreach in our region. They had gotten word that I was taking a trip to South Korea with my family this summer and the wheels began to turn. Perhaps it would be possible to stop in Kazakhstan to teach on the way to or from the Far East. I told them I would begin to assess whether such a trip would be possible.

After discussing things with Jenna and with our Elders here at FPC, I came to the conclusion that God was not only permitting such a trip to happen, but He was actually removing obstacles and preparing me to go on this trip. At the time, I was not yet sure why. But it was quickly becoming clear that I needed to go. Next up was a call with two men in the field, Jeff and Igor. (For their safety in the field we will leave their full names off of this report.)

We met on a Saturday morning in April over Zoom. They described the task at hand and the general needs of the churches and leadership in their area. It was clear to me that my work with Church Health and Revitalization intersected with these critical mission points and that I was an ideal person to begin to put together the material for such a class. Even though this invitation and the way forward to go was very encouraging and clear, and even though I could see how my current work with churches here in MWP could be helpful, the prospect of writing such a class from the ground up was now before me. I suddenly wondered if I had bitten off more than I could chew (so to speak).

The work of writing such a class was going to be challenging enough, but typically the material was gathered and submitted in the early spring for such a trip. In our case, the invitation and the need was presented somewhat late and out of the blue leaving me only 8 weeks to prepare the entire course of nearly 35 to 40 hours and 8 separate lectures, along with the supporting articles and reading for the class. This would have to be done along with my work here at FPC as well as the seminars and help as the Church Health Coordination I am doing.

As I began working on the outlines for the lectures it was becoming clear to me that I had to plan out the whole class with a certain goal or trajectory. I had to know the key aspects of church development and practical tools in order to properly guide the class toward those ideas effectively. It took me numerous attempts but once I had the main ideas for each lecture I began to write each class individually. By the first week of May, I had my outlines mostly done. Now I needed to get the articles and extra resources

prepared and formatted to be sent to the team in Central Asia to be translated into Russian. With Paiges help here in the office a complete workbook was finished and ready for translation by the end of May. In total it was 136 pages, complete with discussion sections and resources. It was a notebook for a class on how the gospel informs the whole of our work inside our churches and outside our churches to reach the world with the gospel.

Now, it was the first week of June. One more Zoom call with the guys on the ground and I was just a couple of weeks away from the trip. Only now did it dawn on me that I needed to research a bit about the place I was travelling to. I had to find out if I needed any specific considerations for immunization or for political situations in the country and so on. I quickly learned about their food preferences (horse and lamb) and the kinds of plugs for charging devices that I would need. Suddenly, I was aware that this trip was coming and coming soon.

On the way to Kazakhstan, I stopped in Budapest Hungary to visit with our World Outreach Missionaries there. (Again, their names must remain off this report since it is published online.) But I was a youth pastor to them when they were just high school students many years ago in Northeast Ohio. So, this was not only an opportunity to visit with Missionaries whom our church supports, but also a chance to see old friends. They are people who are dear to me and close friends across many years. They also happen to have been in direct contact with some of the people I was soon to see in Kazakhstan (another tremendous providence from God).

After a couple days with them, I boarded my flight to Kazakhstan. An overnight flight, I arrived at 7 AM. Igor met me at the airport. He is a minister at a Reformed church in Russia. He organized the class and invited the students from various places to participate. He is also the head of a seminary which is the entity that I was supporting with my class instruction to the students. Due to the ongoing conflict in that part of the world many professors cannot make it to teach such classes in person.

Igor dropped me at the hotel, and I briefly unpacked and prepared for lunch with his family and three of the students who had arrived early. After lunch I was invited to go on a hike with them, but I declined, to rest for the class ahead of me and to get over the jetlag that was being felt due to the overnight flight. The rains came that afternoon and upon returning to the hotel they said I had made a good choice.

The class began on Monday morning. The translator was a pastor named Dennis. He did a tremendous job for me and the whole class. The first lecture was 3 hours on the God who loves the world He made. "For God so loved the World that He gave His only Son". This idea is the whole reason why churches and the mission of God's kingdom from churches to our world exist. After each lecture, the class moved into a time of Q and A with me. Let me tell you, the students in the class asked very theologically astute questions. They asked very pointed and difficult questions. They asked questions that wanted proof for the places where they were skeptical of the material presented. I have to say, I was initially surprised by this, and I wondered how the whole week would turn out.

Ultimately, I began to perceive in their questions the places where they were struggling in their local ministry contexts to maintain healthy congregations and to build effective bridges for ministry and outreach into their communities. This was amazing since the whole class was geared toward answering these exact concerns and needs (little did I know when I was writing it weeks earlier). It turns out that this was exactly what they were hoping to get help with, and God had prepared me to bring such help to them in the form of the material I prepared.

We took a break for lunch and the second lecture began at about 2pm. This lecture was about the Great Commission and the Great Commandment, as well as the Sacraments of Communion and Baptism. We talked at length about the need for

our churches to focus on the main thing...the Gospel of Jesus Christ. And our focus here must be fleshed out in how we do life together in the church. Class ended at 6PM or 6:30 on day one.

We remained at the hotel together and ate at a nice restaurant there. The food was very pleasant, and the conversations carried on regarding much of the material long into the evening. I retired to my room at about 9PM to prepare for the next day. Day two was much the same as day one. Now our topics were service, evangelism, and outreach. We looked at Philippians 2 and the attitude that Christ Jesus had as he came to accomplish the mission His Father sent Him to complete.

Again, the class had many questions. They were still very tough, and a tinge of skepticism seemed to accompany some of them. As the week continued, I could see these questions shift from curiosity to searching for wisdom and help. The material moved into the practical ways that evangelism and the love of Christ in the gospel must change us as Christians. They must change how we do worship, and how we seek to reach the lost.

We began to uncover the places in our own lives where we do not love others as Christ has loved us. One student confessed as much before the class. Another began to pray for help from the Holy Spirit to change how he ministered to his congregation. There was much appreciation for the practical nature of the class material and how it was a workshop on how to do ministry and develop evangelistic culture in their congregations. I was able to do a portion of a lecture on "the three circles" evangelism tool and how it represents our own need for faith and repentance.

By day four I was very appreciative of the students in the class. I learned a lot about their own ministry contexts. Some of the students were ministering in churches out of their own homes to just three or four people. Another student was an apprentice or assistant to a pastor. He helped with worship and was just starting his theological education. He said the class was very accessible and necessary for him. I appreciated his kind words.

One female student said she learned that she had gifts and could lead a small group in her church. She grew to understand that such a small group was more than just a ministry to those inside of her church but could be used to reach others with the gospel outside of the church as well. Her insights and interactions in the class were some of the most helpful and eye-opening to the whole class.

In the end, many of the theological concerns and the debates they were struggling with in their church contexts began to fade into the background in favor of the gospel and its primacy. They began to see the importance of embodying the love of Christ in every issue of the church and its needs. This personal growth in gospel understanding is key to taking on the office of a servant of Jesus.

I am thankful for my time with the students. I am so glad that God helped me as I wrote the material. I was blessed to be challenged by the students and as I went back to my room to prepare for the next day's lectures, I knew that God had given me just the things that needed to be conveyed. This was confirmed as I listened to the students' responses and their appreciation for the lectures. The translator, the organizer, the online participants and the in-person class were all very kind and had much to say they took away from the week.

A major thank you is in order to our Elders, and to you the congregation for allowing me the extra week to take the trip. Thanks to Jenna for giving me the extra couple of days and for taking the kids with her to Korea ahead of time. Thanks to World Outreach and to my friends Adam and Andrew (who you met as he filled in for me that first week I was away). Thanks to Paige for formatting the workbook to be sent to the translators. Thanks to Dan Borgelt for filling in as well. And thanks be to God for preparing divine

appointments like this class in Almaty. I had no idea that I would be privileged to teach and serve the Lord by helping these wonderful servants and ministers and brothers and sisters in the Lord in Central Asia.

I am so happy to be home with the family. We missed you all while we were away and are so happy to be back here in Greenville to continue the work God is doing among our congregation. We are so pleased that God has called us to be part of this congregation. We look forward to all He is doing among us. Please continue to pray for our church and to invite your friends and family to be a part of this wonderful congregation.
