THE RESURRECTION & THE LIFE

Jesus said, "I am the resurrection and the life. Whoever believes in me, though he die, yet shall he live, and everyone who lives and believes in me shall never die. Do you believe this?" John 11:25-26

The words of the text above are among the most prominent quotes from Jesus in all the gospel accounts. Screensavers, posters, and magnets proudly display them in Christian bookstores, homes, and churches across America. As usual we are best served by the Word of God as we observe what we find in its pages as part of the context. In this case, we understand that Jesus utters these words in response to the question posed to him by Martha after the death of her brother Lazarus.

The startling reality of a fallen world often causes us to question God. We wonder why things happen.

THE WESTMINSTER LARGER CATECHISM



First Presbyterian Church of Greenville Ohio Minutes of the Session of January 11, 2024

I. Opening

A. Call meeting to order with reading of the Word and prayer

The January 2024 stated meeting of the Session of First Presbyterian Church of Greenville was called to order on January 11, 2023, at First Presbyterian Church at 7:00 PM by Pastor Andrew Gilman. Pastor Gilman opening the meeting with prayer.

Members Present: Pam Bowman, Wes Jetter, Jan Roestamadji, Helen Miller, Craig Leland, and Randy

Members Absent: Peter Haviza

Guests: Page Ervin and Don Stevenson

Approval of Agenda A motion was made to approve the agenda, and to give Paige Ervin a "voice" at the meeting by Jan Roestamadji and seconded by Craig Leland. The motion passed 6-0.

Approval of Minutes Jan Roestamadji motioned to approve the December 2023 minutes. This motion was seconded by Helen Miller. The motion passed 6-0.

II. Agenda Items

Renovation Project John Vehre presented a brief report on the current state of the building project. He mentioned the current status of various changes orders and presented invoices from Brun to the session. He also shared the most recent invoice from Garamn-Miller. JV indicated that the project was still on schedule to be completed prior to the Presbytery meeting in early February. He mentioned that there will be a building inspection on January 29, 2024, conducted by the city. Finally, he indicated there is still one invoice yet to be presented by Bruns, but as of this time 75% of the cost of the project has been invoiced. JV motioned to accept this report, seconded by Craig Leland and it passed 6-0.

Pam Bowman submitted a written report of furnishings and indicated that the price of \$68,722 came out a little below the budget. These items were purchased from Innovative Office Solutions with the process beginning on October 17 and finishing by November 13, 2023. Actual installation is projected at taking place on February 2, 2024. In her report she indicated the proceeds toward these furnishings came from donations in excess of pledges for the overall project and money received from the sale of the Don Nease property. Her report also indicated a small fund-raising drive was made for various children's items and toys, which amounted to around \$4,500.00. Pam Bowman made a motion to accept this report, seconded by Wes Jetter and passing by 6-0.

Financial Report Craig Leland presented the financial report. For the meeting he had the usual written documentation. Verbal highlights that he mentioned tonight, included that end of year giving for 2023 was \$150,703. This was \$4,500 higher than 2022. Receipts in December amounted to \$20,419. During his report, he also mentioned categories on the spread sheet will be changing and in particular Paige's financial information should be transferred from the youth area to administration. This likely will be carried out in 2024. He also indicated that the Maintenance manager allocation at \$5,122 was considerably higher than the budgeted \$2,500 and explained that was a result of Ben's added responsibilities. After these and other items were discussed, Wes Jetter motioned to accept this report, seconded by Jan Roestamadji and passing 6-0.

Craig also submitted a written annual report. In it he mentioned changes to the per capita Benevolence Expense, which now is based on a percentage of the church's budget versus a head count. He also indicated that the church has received \$32,194.00 from the sale of the Don Nease property. This represented the church's share of 7/15 from the total sale of that property. Finally, the report indicates that an internal audit of the 2022 and 2023 finances will be done in 2024 led by Becky Luce. After some discussion, Jan Roestamadji motioned to accept this report seconded by Helen Miller and passing, 6-0.

FYI Elder Training Andrew Gilman presented a brief discussion on Elder training based on commentary from Charles Spurgeon.

Mover Pay for Clearing out the storage unit Andrew has approached members of the Littlefield family, who will help move items from storage back into the proper location in the church. He has negotiated an amount of \$800.00 to carry out this work. Jan Roestamadji motioned to accept this moving fee, which was seconded by Craig Leland and passed 6-0.

FYI Youth Employees Andrew Gilman mentioned that Brandon and Kelsey Ervin have been approached and have agreed to handle the twice-a-month youth meetings. They will be paid \$100.00 a session for a total annual cost of \$2,400.

FYI Worship Committee A written communion schedule for 2024 was presented. Session members were asked to review and verify if the dates work for everybody.

Annual Congregation Meeting Agenda Andrew Gilman presented an agenda for the upcoming January 21, 2024 Congregation Meeting. It included 25 items. Pam Bowman motioned to accept this agenda, seconded by Jan Roestamadji and passing 6-0.

Pastor's Report (Andrew Gilman – written submission) Pastor Gilman submitted a written report of his activities for December. He also mentioned that he will be taking an extended vacation to South Korea, this summer and will miss church services on July 13 and 20. Jan Roestamadji motioned to accept the report, seconded by Wes Jetter and passing by a margin of 6-0.

FYI Helen Miller indicated that for the February 4 luncheon, it would be nice if session members could provide a few desserts.

Stanley Steamer Pastor Gilman reported that Stanley Steamer has been approached to clean carpets and cushions in the sanctuary and chapel. Various levels of service were contemplated, but the carpets and cushions cleaning were considered in our price range. This work can be carried out for \$2,209.00. Pam Bowman, motioned to go ahead with this cleaning seconded by Jan Roestamadji and passing by 6-0.

Deacon's Meeting A written Deacon's report was submitted to session. After reviewing it a motion was made by Helen Miller to accept the report, seconded by Wes Jetter and passing 6-0.

III. Closing

Prayer. A closing prayer was made by Pam Bowman.

Adjournment. Wes Jetter motioned to adjourn, which was seconded by Helen Miller. The motion passed 6-0.

We want to understand why things are the way they are, especially when so many of our churches tell us only grace, goodness, light and love without any reference to sin, death, the devil and the curse of Genesis 3. This lack of complete teaching leaves us to struggle in our lack of understanding of biblical things and God's providential purposes.

I think it is the case that most of our knowing comes through asking questions. From our earliest days as children, when we wanted to know something, we asked questions of our parents: "Mom, what is the moon made of?" "Dad, how do birds fly?" "Mom, where do babies come from?" "Dad, how do you build a fire?" Our questions lead us on to answers that help us to know.

But some questions seem unanswerable: Why did God allow that man to have colon cancer? Why did God take that woman when she was still relatively young? Why didn't God heal when so many people were praying? Does God even know and care about our sorrows, grief, and pain?

I think there is some measure of comfort that the Bible encourages us to ask these questions by presenting us with people who have the same types of questions. For instance, the scene in John 11–the events connected with Lazarus' death and resurrection—is filled with people asking such questions.

Why didn't Jesus come to heal Lazarus? Three times, the text implicitly asks that question (vv. 21, 32, 37). That question is present because the people believed—just as we believe—that Jesus has the ability to heal. Now, Bible readers already know the answer to the question, because Jesus had already said—"It is for the glory of God" (v. 4) and "So that you might believe" (v. 15). In other words, Jesus didn't heal Lazarus because not healing him would further God's glory and His disciples' salvation.

Such an answer may calm our minds, but it doesn't soothe our aching hearts. It raises a second question found in John 11: Does Jesus

care about our grieving? The answer from the text is that He does care; in fact, He cares deeply. He was stirred (vv. 33, 38)—deeply moved in His spirit, greatly troubled, agitated, and angry—because of His friend's death. Also, He sorrowed (v. 35)—He wept, He burst into tears, He cried with those who were crying. He cared and continues to care for those who weep tears of heartbreak, loss, and grief.

Thankfully, though, Jesus' caring doesn't end with tears. In answer to the final question that this text asks—Can Jesus do anything about our dying?—the Bible gives a glorious affirmative. Not only did Jesus promise that "everyone who lives and believes in me shall never die" (v. 26), He gave a demonstration of His power by raising Lazarus from the dead. He said and showed that He is "the resurrection and the life."

This story of Jesus raising Lazarus from the dead is the final story in a series of miraculous works done by Jesus. John writes them down for us in his gospel and theologians often refer to this as John's "Book of Signs". This is a record of 7 such miraculous deeds that Jesus performed to show the world His true identity. The act of raising Lazarus from the dead was perhaps the most amazing feat which turned the heads of many Israelites causing them to lay down their palms and clothing before Jesus as he rode into Jerusalem on a donkey. We know this today as "Palm Sunday".

The excitement at Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem that day was a result of the word of Lazarus' miraculous resurrection by Jesus. But only a few short days later, the crowds would drastically turn on Jesus. Even the disciples would have doubts and questions causing them to fear for their lives and abandon Jesus in his hour of need. They grieved the loss of their friend and Lord all day Saturday. They wondered how the one who they believed was the Messiah could die in such a horrible manner on a cross as a criminal. They were left to ask; what do we do now?

It wasn't until Sunday that Jesus showed them the answer to their questions and gave them hope

and joy. Even as Jesus showed himself to them after the stone was rolled away, they struggled to comprehend what God had done on their behalf. But as they came to grips with this new reality where God's Kingdom broke into the world and defeated Satan once and for all; forgiving their sins, and redeeming the world God made, they would go on to live bold lives sharing their faith across the ancient world.

So this Easter season, I hope you are all wrestling with your 'Friday and Saturday' (Jesus in the grave) questions in light of the glorious Day of Resurrection (The stone rolled away). It may not mean that your situation or struggles have automatically been resolved or brought to a tidy

conclusion, but it does mean that we get to ask these questions with the hope and expectation that God has provided everything we need in Jesus.

So, we can bring our questions to this Jesus because He offers us a definitive answer. Thanks be to God, even though our hearts fill with questions in our sorrows, we look forward to the day when He once again will shout, "My children, come out!" And we will rise, body and soul together, (just like Lazarus) made whole, made new, with no more tears or questions. Jesus' answer to Martha's question was to let her know that He is the Resurrection and the Life. This is true for us as followers of Jesus today as well.

DOOR UPDATES

FIRE DOOR PROTOCAL

Part of the renovation we just completed included updating the fire alarm system. Part of this update included adding "hold opens" on the double door entries to the Sanctuary and The Hall (see image at the right). These hold opens are magnetic and in case of a fire, would release the door to shut on its own. This means these doors should never be shut and can always stay open.



However, every other door that has the same brown wood look as the double doors should be shut when not in use. These are fire doors and are responsible for containing the flames, if there were to be any. If you are ever in the building and see one of these fire doors propped open, please shut it. This also includes the large metal roll up service counter doors in the kitchen. These should be kept down at all times when not in use.

LOCKED-DOWN CHILDREN'S WING

The children's wing of the building is now locked down during worship. The doors are open before and after worship. However, once service has begun, the doors will be shut and locked. If you need to go into the children's wing during worship, press the doorbell on the double doors and one of the volunteers inside will be able to buzz you in.

The locked down wing is new still. Please be patient with us as we get it all figured out and work out any kinks. We are still training on how to lock/unlock the doors.




















COMING SOON: APRIL 2024
