### Rejoice Church Council Update

Your church council met on Sunday, February 16. Sara Nelson and Mark Ahrenholz have spent hours on our financial

records and we approved a Treasurer's report which shows General Fund expenses greater than income by just under \$12,000 in January; cost of our mortgage exceeded income by just under \$1,000. Pledges to the General Fund for 2025 are currently \$104,076 and to the Mortgage Fund are \$50,897. Thank you for your generosity and faithful giving! Thank you Sara and Mark for your diligence and hard work on the books!

Each member of the council shared their goals for this year. This is a work in progress, but here is what those goals look like so far:

Nurture the faith of our members through worship and educational opportunities. Re-establish Faith Formation programs: Sunday/Funday School, Bible study etc.

Provide opportunities for our members to respond to the Gospel through stewardship.

- Recruit, train, engage and recognize volunteers, teachers and leaders to support educational programs.
- Develop calendar, procedures, budgets for leadership of outreach events throughout the year.
- Gather time and talents information from adults and youth.

Be a caring congregation for our members and within our community.

- Design programs that encourage interaction and learning between generations.
- Build partnerships with local schools, community organizations, other churches and collaborate on educational
- initiatives that benefit the broader community.
- Develop programs that celebrate and respect diverse backgrounds and perspectives and promote cultural
- competency and understanding within the community.
- Organize and train lay visitors and new member partners.
- Explore options for additional mission partners in the community.

Improve the administration and management functions of our church.

- Seek funding which can support hiring of support staff and/or investment in resources for educational
- purposes.
- Plan for transitions on the council: recruit new members, provide clear roles and expectations.
- Hire a new music coordinator.
- Organize archived church materials and digitize materials as much as possible.
- Update the church history.
- Develop a narrative budget for 2026.
- Develop procedures and timelines for completing and maintaining our financial records.
- Continue to review our insurance needs and coverage and gather quotes in order to secure affordable
- commercial insurance.

Improve communication patterns in all areas of church life.

- Develop a comprehensive communication plan using multiple channels to inform the congregation and
- community about educational opportunities.
- Improve use of data in ChurchTrac to communicate with all members as needed.

Make Rejoice Lutheran Church a welcoming place for members and guests.

- Complete continuing maintenance, repair, and support actions including a Fall and Spring Cleanup Day.
- Explore options to lease space in the Education Wing and the land behind the Food Self.

#### Growing Young, Part 3

Empathize with Today's Young People: Why 25 is the New 15, and 15 is the New 25

When you were growing up - especially when you were a teenager, did anyone ever say to you, "We had it so much harder than you kids do today when we were growing up."? I sure did. And, honestly, when it happened, I felt misunderstood and often unheard.

We've been working through the book *Growing Young* since the beginning of the year. The chapter we're focused on this month begins with an interesting story of a young teenager named Steve, who was wrestling - as teenagers often do - with important questions of life. He went to his pastor to ask a simple question that was, really, a much deeper question about the nature of suffering. And, rather than listening to or digging deeper to understand the deeper questions behind his simple, more surface-level question, his pastor answered that question, rather than digging deeper to more fully understand why Steve was asking the question to begin with.

That young man - whose full name was Steve Jobs and who would eventually become the founder and CEO of Apple, Inc. - walked out of the church that day and never came back. When he went to his church to help him pin down answers, his congregation failed to understand what he was really asking.

When someone comes to us with a question, especially a young person, it's often an opportunity or on-ramp to a deeper conversation about faith instead of being a dead end. Churches that want to "grow young" must dive into the deep waters of the lives of our teenagers and young adults. We need to deeply empathize with their experiences today in what is often a challenging and frightening world.

By *empathy*, we don't mean patronizing young people. It also doesn't mean a superficial or false sympathy. It also doesn't mean judgmentalism, especially when it's cloaked in "helpful suggestions." When we talk about empathy, we mean *feeling with* young people. According to Stanford University, it's the work we do to understand people - the way they do things and why, what they're going through, what they might need, how they think about the world, and what is meaningful to them.<sup>1</sup>

Young people are wrestling with three ultimate questions: Who am I? (a question of *identity*); Where do I fit? (a question of *belonging*); and What difference do I make? (a question of *purpose*). These questions aren't unique to young people, teenagers and young adults, but they often feel them much more intensely than older generations. Research has shown that adolescence is beginning earlier and ending later than in previous generations. Twenty-five feels like the new 15 and 15 often seems like the new 25. The starting line for our young people is earlier and later than those of different generations. The search for identity by young people is made much harder by their pervasive stress brought about by fears about what is happening in our world, the planet, and their own future. (As I was growing up we never had "active shooter" drills, did you?) It's also challenged by their peripheral faith - often feeling that they are part of, but not quite part of, our congregation. Then, the quest of our young people is also challenged by always present technology, growing sexual inquisitiveness, and adult abandonment. This generation's hunger for purpose remains unsatisfied because of their cynical realism and required straddling of many cultures and expectations.

Here are a few ideas that we might lean into to support our young people:

- Always respond with grace, love and mission. The good news of God's grace is more important than ever for our young people to hear.
- Think about your own story and your own journey as a teenager or young adult. It may be hard to rewind, but think about your own quest for identity, belonging and purpose. What was that like? How might that help you empathize more deeply with our young people?
- Stereotype no more. Recognize that every person including every young person is unique and wants to be seen in that way, just like you and me. Lean into their own experience with more empathetic listening so you can begin to understand what hurdles they are facing today.
- When you see something new, confusing, and maybe even offensive in culture, ask why. Ask why a trend is popular and then think about how it might be connected with identity, belong, or purpose. A conversation like that would go a long way towards understanding the experience of today's young people.
- Walk through our church building and worship service with the eyes of a young person. Empathize with how the church culture you have come to love feels to a first-time visitor, especially a young person.
- Dive deeper with one young person. Take the time. Notice them. Listen to them.
- Hang out once in a while with young people. It's an opportunity to learn about trends in youth culture, plus it helps keep all of us more young.
- Don't leave singles feeling singled out. Extended adolescence means there's a new gap between college and marriage that most congregations ignore. We often blame folks in their twenties for not being involved in our churches, but the reality is that we offer little or nothing for single adults that age.
- Support marriages...tangibly. Perhaps offer to mentor a younger couple that is nearing or just married.




## **Dinner Church returns!**
