Board Briefs

On Monday, April 22 the Pella Christian High School Board met in regular session. Cassia Boender opened the meeting with devotions and prayer. The board approved the hiring of Taunya Van Maanen to oversee Food Services for the combined Pella Christian Schools, noting that Bonnie Van Wyngarden will remain involved in the high school to ensure continuity of the program. The board reviewed matters related to the merging of the schools, which will officially occur on July 1, 2024. Committees and administrator reports were received. The board approved the installation of a sprinkler system for the baseball field and football practice fields. The board also approved updated part-time guidelines for students to better comply with ESA rules and align with our 7-period modified block. There being no further business, Mike Fransman closed the meeting with prayer.

Mary Poppins Earns Nine Awards

Pella Christian High School's Theatre Troupe recently earned nine awards from the Iowa High School Musical Theatre Awards Showcase and will be honored Thursday evening, May 30, 2024 at the Des Moines Performing Arts Civic Center. A panel of adjudicators, including performing arts professionals and educators, awarded PCHS's fall production of *Mary Poppins* with an Outstanding Musical Production award. This is the fifth time that PCHS was given this award, the highest award possible. Other honors from the production include four awards for Outstanding Performance in a Leading Role: Abby Dart (as Mary Poppins), Evan Tschetter (as Bert), Mia Andringa (as Mrs. Banks), and Jenna Vande Zande (as Jane); and Special Recognition for a Performance in a Principal Role: Breece Gibson (as Miss Andrew). In addition, honors were given for Outstanding **Ensemble and Outstanding Community** Engagement. Lastly, Abby Dart, Evan Tschetter, Jenna Vande Zande and Mia Andringa were also nominated to audition as Iowa representatives for Nationals in New York City. The musical was directed by Marlo Van Peursem, Aaron Fitzgerald, Paulina Loaiza and Daryl Van Zee.

PCHS World Languages

¡Hola a todos! The PCHS World Language Department has been busy this year under the instruction of Mrs. Joni Van Der Pol (Spanish 1) and Ms. Rebekah Cashen (Spanish 2, 3 and 4). Mrs. Van Der Pol also teaches English As A Second Language (ESL) and supports our international students.

All four language domains are taught at each level of Spanish: reading, writing, listening and speaking. It is amazing to see how far the students progress in one year! Spanish 1 students have read a novel called Pobre Ana and will learn to give directions in Spanish. Recently Spanish 1 students designed posters that share the Gospel and God's love—you may see them posted around our community.

Spanish 2 students recently began a novel study of Bianca Nieves y los 7 toritos. They practice their Spanish skills while learning about bullfighting and other Spanish culture. Spanish 3 students are getting ready to create a cooking show to show off their speaking and cooking skills. Spanish 4 is wrapping up their semesterlong study of the authentic novel Cajas de Cartón as well as learning how to follow recipes in Spanish, give directions in the kitchen, and cook hispanic food. Levels 2-4 have also enjoyed building community with each other through a March Madness style music bracket, getting exposed to 16 hispanic songs and choosing a champion -"Tiene Sabor" by Alex Cuba.

It is a blessing to share the Lord's heart for the nations through World Language instruction. We know that one day "all nations, tribes, peoples and languages" will be represented in heaven and we pray that the Lord will use our students to be a part of HIS story through their study of Spanish.

Worship Sports or Sports as Worship?

We often view sports as an avenue to teach our kids God-honoring traits such as hard work, perseverance, humility, and selflessness. Nearly every high school in the country teaches these character traits through sports. But are we at Pella Christian going a step further in teaching our kids that athletics can be an act of worship? We believe our school has a beautiful responsibility to teach kids how to worship God in all spheres of life and learning--including athletics. This is a noble pursuit...yet so difficult to put into practice! Just as authentic worship doesn't automatically happen when we sit in church

on a Sunday morning, stepping onto the court or wearing a Pella Christian jersey doesn't quarantee God-honoring worship, either.

Our deep hope is that Pella Christian athletics would be a training ground for worshipful hearts - that every competitive moment would be an opportunity to magnify Christ. At the end of the day, worship is not bound to a church building, a special song, or even a basketball court. True worship is a state of the heart. Athletics provide unique opportunities to mold hearts and practice worship. And we *all* have a great responsibility to take advantage of these moments.

Sooner than we think, our athletes' playing time at Pella Christian will end. The ball will stop bouncing, the countless hours of practice will cease, and the crowds will no longer gather to cheer them on. What won't end, however, is the pursuit of a worshipful heart. When former athletes go on to build houses, care for patients, crunch financial numbers, or fold piles of laundry, may their athletic experiences at Pella Christian have shaped their understanding of what it means to do everything to the glory of God.



When we think about being a God-Worshipper, does a basketball court come to mind?

Perhaps God gave us the gift of sports so that we could experience Him in a way that no other avenue provides. When our kids play the sport they love with a worshipful heart, they are not only training to offer up their lives as an act of worship but are also allowing God to draw them closer to Himself.

ESAs & Donations to the Christian School

I'm often asked if Christian schools still need donations now that we have Education Savings Accounts (ESAs). I can answer without reservation, "Yes, yes we do!" Ultimately, ESAs do not directly affect the school's two main revenue sources, tuition and donations. Here's why.

Tuition covers between 85%-90% of the budget. ESAs provide tuition support directly to parents, bypassing the school and lowering net tuition paid by parents. ESAs help families, but they do *not add additional* revenue to the school, they merely replace tuition revenue the school would have received anyway.

Donations cover 10%-15% of the school's budget. Donations reduce the overall cost of tuition for families, allow greater investment in special programs, and fund larger capital projects. ESAs have no direct effect on donations. As ESAs become universal, recipient families should, in theory, have more room in their budgets to donate more generously to the school. But ultimately, we can't compel those families to give without raising tuition for all families.

This plays into how the broader Society directs their giving, too. With ESAs, there's less need for blanket tuition support to all families who already receive \$7,800+ per student from the state. There's more need for direct support to the ministry of Christian Education, its programs, and its buildings. The 10%-15% of the budget not covered through tuition still needs to be raised, more so now that schools need more infrastructure capacity for more students.

By comparison, it's worth remembering local public schools receive between \$14,500-\$16,500 per student plus other capital improvement dollars. Our tuition comes nowhere close to those numbers, yet we desire comparable facilities, professional staff, student supports, and high-level programming for our kids. That funding needs to come from somewhere.

Outstanding and faithful society support has allowed Pella Christian to offer these programs to generations of children. If we believe Christian Education is an essential part of our Kingdom building, donations directly to the Christian school will need to continue as they have in the past.
